MEA's 3% Case

The state Supreme Court has issued a notice that they will hear oral arguments in early November, regarding the union's lawsuit seeking the return of money taken from school MEA paychecks. The deductions were taken in order to fund retiree health care that was never guaranteed to be provided. Three previous court rulings have been found in MEA's favor, but Governor Snyder appealed again last year. All court decisions cited agreement that deducting the money violated state and federal constitutional protections involving the taking of private property without compensation, due process and impairment of contracts.
